

ABOUT THE PANELISTS

Professor Roger Leakey DSc, PhD, BSc, NDA was Director of Research at the International Centre for Research in Agroforestry (1993-1997) and Professor of Agroecology and Sustainable Development of James Cook University, in Cairns, Australia (2001-2006). He is Vice President of the International Tree Foundation.

Marc Eberle has been making documentaries for international broadcasters in Southeast Asia since 2000. In 2018 he founded SmartAgro Sustainable Innovations Co. Ltd. to create a driver for change. SmartAgro's mission is to re-design agricultural practices and change the paradigm of how we add long term value to people, small-holder communities and the ecosystem in the farming sector.

Mat Boerson is a regenerative farmer engaged with 100 acres of land near Green Lake, Wisconsin. He and his wife have built a diversified farm business focused on grass fed beef and certified organic vegetables. Mathew also serves on the board of the Green Lake Association and is actively involved with the Foxhead Regenerative Agriculture Project.

Ken Bates is a Commissioner on the Green Lake Sanitary District and a Board Member of the Foxhead Regenerative Agriculture Program. His personal project is using regenerative agriculture to restore 27 degraded acres.

Tom Eddy is a biologist and botanist who serves as an adjunct professor for Marian University and University of Wisconsin. He is a founding member of the Green Lake Conservancy land trust, an appointed member of Wisconsin's Natural Areas Preservation Council, and a board member of Freeland USA.

Christina Scaringe is General Counsel for Animal Defenders International, a nonprofit frontline organization with teams in the UK, US, Colombia, Peru, and South Africa Christina works to further ADI's global ethos of compassion, social justice, and equality, to effect long-term change for non-human Earthlings, and to make our world a better and kinder place for us all.

Jacob Phelps is an environmental social scientist with a particular interest in policy, legal and governance dimensions of tropical biodiversity conservation and sustainable resource management. He is Senior Lecturer at the Lancaster Environment Centre in the UK, from where he coordinates conservation-litigation.org.

Stephen Kohn is Chairman of the Board of Directors of the National Whistleblower Center and is the most published author on whistleblower law, writing the first-ever legal treatise on whistleblowing (in 1985). Kohn won the largest-ever tax whistleblower reward (\$104 million) paid to a whistleblower who exposed billions of dollars in illegal offshore accounts held in the Swiss bank UBS.

Dylan Bizhikiins Jennings is a member of the marten clan. He graduated from the University of Wisconsin Madison with degrees in Anthropology, Archaeology, Environmental Studies, and American Indian Studies. Jennings served two consecutive terms as an elected Tribal Council Member for the Bad River Tribe

Steven Galster is a Green Lake native and founder of Freeland. He is an expert on transnational organized crime and trafficking. Projects he designed disrupted illicit trades in people and wildlife, enabling the recovery of endangered species and vulnerable communities in Russia, Africa and Asia. Galster and his reports have featured on CNN, BBC, TIME, National Geographic, Discovery, Al Jazeera, and in the New York Times.

Onkuri Majumdar is the Deputy Director of Programs at Freeland and has worked on wildlife law enforcement for over a decade in India and southeast Asia, training hundreds of police, customs and forest officers on covert investigation techniques. An Emerging Wildlife Conservation Leader in 2013, and a National Geographic Emerging Explorer in 2015.

Dr. Juliana Machado Ferreira founded and serves as Executive Director of Freeland Brasil, whose mission is to conserve biodiversity by ending wildlife trafficking. Ferreira is a TED Senior Fellow and received her Ph.D. in Conservation Genetics from Sao Paulo University.
